City of Coupland News

As is stated in each *Herald*, the City Council meetings are held the second Thursday of each month beginning at 5 p.m. in the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department Meeting Room. Copies of the Agendas and Minutes from all Council Meetings can be found on the City's website, http://www.cityofcouplandtx.us.

As many of you know, the city sponsored the annual clean-up day on June 12. The council voted this year to have four dumpsters instead of three to provide the citizens of Coupland added space to dispose of non-essential items. As has been the case, there were numerous items piled on top of and beside the dumpsters, including a mattress. We have repeatedly stated that a mattress or box spring of any type is not allowed. It seems foolish to punish those who adhere to the rules of what can and cannot be dumped. Also, the day of the week is always picked to allow those who work outside the home the opportunity to participate in the cleanup. It is not by choice, but perhaps will become a necessity to schedule the cleanup on a weekday so dumpsters can be picked up in a timely manner. Another suggestion is to ask citizens to man the dumpsters in shifts to discourage illegal items being thrown away. This certainly does not seem like a good scenario.

Road issues continue to be the biggest issue and problem that the city seems to continually deal with. We do know that the Murray and South Broad Streets project is scheduled to be done this summer. We do not have a definitive date but know that all of the preliminary work has been done (county project and part of the Williamson County 2018 bond project). The issue on CR 458 which was thought to be one culvert (or both culverts) did not turn out to be culvert issues but instead road issues. We are presently working on a plan with the help of our engineer to get bids to do road repair over each of the culverts on CR 458. The next time you have the opportunity to drive CR 458, do check out the speed limit signs. They are there for your safety!

Appearing on the November ballot this year will be the reauthorization of the 0.25% sales tax. Law requires that this be done every four years. Revenue from this use tax is revenue that is only permitted to be used for the maintenance and repair of municipal streets. This is NOT A NEW TAX. The sales tax will remain the same at 8.25%.

What a difference a year makes! At this time last year, my article dealt with the effects COVID-19 was having on our world. Generous donations were given to help defray the costs involved with incorporation.

Back to 2021—National Night Out is scheduled for Tuesday, August 3, 6:30, at the Coupland Depot. I urge everyone to attend. Hot dogs, chili, and other fixings will be served as well as cookies and drinks. Hope to see you there. Choo Choo fest is scheduled to occur October 3. Look for further

Coupland Volunteer Fire Department News

More calls and modernization

Coupland VFD firefighters were toned for 304 calls in the first six months of 2021, putting us on track for around 600 calls for the year. Over the past five years we've seen an increase from ~35 calls a month to ~60. This increase continues to push us to innovate and modernize the way we operate.

We're introducing a couple of new tactics to help meet these demands.

After several years of close cooperation with our ESD#10 partners in Thrall, we're going to start responding together on pretty much all calls, behaving as if we're two fire stations in a single department. This means we'll immediately have the resources of at least two fire departments available on every call.

During our next recruitment drive, for the first time we'll start recruiting volunteers who are primarily interested in being part of our medical response team. Along with the across-the-board increase in calls for service, we've seen a shift to a higher proportion of medical calls. As of 2021 around half of our calls are medicals, an increase from a third of calls two years ago. Strange as it may seem not everyone is interested in running into burning buildings; some people would rather bandage, splint and take blood pressures... we intend to give them the opportunity.

New equipment

In August we'll be taking delivery of new air-packs for our two engines, along with spare air cylinders. The old packs were becoming unreliable, developing air leaks and generating false alarm signals. The new packs will have a life of around 10 to 15 years.

We're also upgrading the scene lighting on Engine 2, the engine that runs on motor vehicle accidents. This upgrade will replace 20-year-old 12v incandescent lights with new LED scene lighting. This will allow us to light up the area we're working in at night and make our firefighters more visible to traffic.

Our future

As we see growth in the district and the resultant growth in calls, it is vital that we modernize our equipment, our organization, and our response structure. We're directing our efforts to ensure we continue to provide the residents of ESD#10 with a professional level of service, from a team that just happens to be volunteers.

You can't predict the future, so plan for it.


St. Peter's Church News -- By Dana Smith



Post Oak Island Marker

The historical marker for Post Oak Island has been cast at Eagle Sign and Design in New Albany, Indiana, and is on its way to Texas.

Eagle Sign and Design was the winning bidder to produce the Texas Historical Markers after the Southwell Company ceased operating in 2019. The Southwell Company had produced more than 16,000 state historical markers over six decades, 151 years, but a family feud caused it to go out of business.

Eagle Sign and Design submitted the winning bid. It is in New Albany, Indiana, across the Ohio River from Louisville, Kentucky, and is part of its metropolitan area.

The marker will be placed near the Type Cemetery marker at 1200 County Road 466, and it will be dedicated in early Spring 2022.

Executive Director Scott Peck notes, "Fall of 2021 marks the 20 year anniversary of the events of 9/11. In observance, the Museum will be hosting a variety of art Exhibitions. I am developing a show that features ceramic artists from Texas in observance of 9/11. The title is *Broken and Whole*". 

Eldredge and Taylor Artist Senn in Houston show

Letitia and Taylor artist Karl Senn have pieces in a show in Houston at the Art Car Museum. They delivered the pieces to Director Noah Edmundson, Assistant Director Alicia Duplan, Gary Hunt, Chendo Guerra, and Kit Blanco.

Letitia explains, "The show opened the first week of June by appointment only with a maximum of 20 people at a time allowed, due to COVID precautions, and will be on display for three months."

There are 75 artists in the show--What I Did on My Covid 'Vacation.' Artists entered artwork that was created during the lockdown. The Art Car Museum, at 140 Heights Blvd., is a private institution dedicated to contemporary art. It exhibits local, national, and international artists with an emphasis on art cars and other fine arts.

Letitia's entry is a gouache painting on paper, 22" x 30" entitled "Finish Lines." Karl's is also a gouache on paper, 27" x 37" entitled "Spiritual Geometry."

Close Encounter for Sculptor Huntington

He recounts, "I was using steel wedges and a sledge to cleave off a few hundred pound chunks of granite along a series of cracks on a 6,000 pound stone, when one of the chunks let loose unexpectedly. I was amazed and grateful how quickly I was able to move to avoid disaster. It 'bruised' my new jeans, taking some of the blue off, but spared my knee joint and leg. I had an assist, thank God."

Due to the Governor having rescinded the COVID restrictions, the ESD Commissioners have been holding Board Meetings in person at the Coupland Fire Station. The approved minutes, meeting notice/agenda and audited financial report are posted on the ESD's website at www.wcesd10.org.

The Thrall and Coupland Volunteer Fire Departments are sending only certified volunteers on medical calls. Both departments have initiated strict mask policies during the pandemic. They have also experienced a rise in other non-medical calls.

The Ignis Fire Academy in Coupland had eleven students in its first session. The Academy is purchasing a forcedentry door for training purposes.

Repairs have been made to several of the fire trucks belonging to the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department which have been necessary due to their age and usage. The Thrall

Volunteer Fire Department fleet of vehicles are fully operational.

The Board of Commissioners met for a Five-Year Strategic Planning Work Session in April to plan future expenditures including extreme weather preparations. A priority purchase within this plan calls for a four-door two-cab tender (firetruck).

The Thrall Volunteer Fire Department is focusing on repairs due to station damages from the winter storm.

The Coupland Volunteer Fire Department is pursuing renovations to the station, including the buildout of a climate-controlled storage area on the 2nd floor of the station. They were donated OSB board for the renovation. They also received a donation of a 300-gallon diesel tank which will be beneficial since it is a 22-mile trip to purchase fuel. They are in the process of upgrading the existing electrical wiring to accommodate additional exterior lighting, exit lights and the addition of 220W wiring for a large propane heater to be installed in the bay area for winter vehicle protection.

The ESD Commissioners have approved the purchase of radio holsters for the volunteers and 20 sets of bunker gear that includes boots, gloves, pants, hood, and jacket. Twenty helmets will be purchased sometime in the future.

The Coupland Volunteer Fire Department toured the new Coupland school building. The department will be able to use the security system to film and will be able to check the security cameras remotely.

The Thrall Volunteer Fire Department hosted a fundraising event with a chicken fried steak luncheon on July 18.

If any of our area residents are interested in volunteering to support our firefighting volunteers, they can contact Jared Cummings, fire chief for the Coupland department, about joining the **Volunteer Auxiliary Unit** which does not require any firefighting involvement (think: "homemade cookies," etc.). 
