#### City of Coupland News--By Mayor Jack Piper

Just as a reminder, the City Council meetings are held the second Thursday of each month beginning at 6 p.m. in the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department Meeting Room. Please see the City of Coupland Website at http://www.cityofcouplandtx.us for copies of the Agendas and Minutes of Council meetings. Feedback is always welcomed.

As indicated in the October Coupland City Council Regular Meeting Minutes, Susan Schmidt chose not to run for another term on the Coupland City Council. Susan served on the Council for 6 years, (since our incorporation). She will be missed. John Roulston-Bates submitted an application for the position. Since no other application was submitted by the August 20 deadline, John was granted an Alderman's seat and administered the Oath of Office at the January 10 meeting.

I continue receiving calls concerning the storage of junk, trash, and vehicles on property in the City limits. The reason I continue posting the nuisance information below again is our hope that our citizens will solve this issue voluntarily. This has worked to some extent. However, we still have a long way to go. The City Council continues discussions concerning the need for a Public Nuisance Ordinance to set guidelines for citizens as well as help to eliminate and correct specific issues along with giving the Council authority and legal means to correct specific situations. **The City will once again provide 2 dumpsters during the Spring to help residents with this issue.** Not any of us want to diminish the property value of our neighbor(s). Could this be a detriment to visitors who drive through our city? The City is actively trying to be proactive in attempts to provide a friendly and welcoming place to all.

The following narrative is from the Texas Health and Safety Code:

#### A public nuisance is:

(1) keeping, storing, or accumulating refuse on premises in a neighborhood unless the refuse is entirely contained in a closed receptacle;

The most recognizable work will most likely be installing the exterior windows. Lettering on the east and




An important part of the function of a caboose--the observation windows around the cupola have been restored.

- (2) keeping, storing, or accumulating rubbish, including newspapers, abandoned **vehicles**, refrigerators, stoves, furniture, tires, and cans, on premises in a neighborhood or within 300 feet of a public street for 10 days or more, unless the rubbish or object is completely enclosed in a building or is not visible from a public street;
- (3) maintaining premises in a manner that creates an unsanitary condition likely to attract or harbor mosquitoes, rodents, vermin, or other disease-carrying pests;
- (4) allowing weeds to grow on premises in a neighborhood if the weeds are located within 300 feet of another residence or commercial establishment;
- (5) maintaining a building in a manner that is structurally unsafe or constitutes a hazard to safety, health, or public welfare because of inadequate maintenance, unsanitary conditions, dilapidation, obsolescence, disaster, damage, or abandonment or because it constitutes a fire hazard.

There are wonderful cooks in residence at our church. There are also others of us who bring a bag of Oreos and help make the iced tea. We certainly don't mind if you skip the worship service and just come for the meal. (The service starts at 10:15 a.m.; if you're just coming for grub, show up a little after 11 a.m., and get in line.)

Aside from a great meal, the potluck is one of the best times to get to know folks in the community. It's a chance to pull up a chair next to a neighbor you don't know well and ask them about their hobbies or their kids or their favorite team. We hope St. Peter's can be a place to connect, with each other, and also with the rest of the community.

The early church centered their worship around the 'Lord's Supper.' For us this is a ritual, where we eat a bite of bread and drink a sip of wine and say prayers that recall Jesus's instruction to his students. Two thousand years ago this was a shared meal. The meal centered around that same bread and wine, but it was a full meal. It was also a community event, where the church welcomed everyone to the table, and everyone, beggar, banker, soldier and priest, was given the same serving.

In the 23rd Psalm we read, "The Lord prepares a table before me, in the presence of my enemies." I think that looks like potluck. In the midst of our present political discord, in the midst of all the stress of life; in the presence of heartache and grief: the Lord sets a table and puts good food on it, and friendly faces around it. We hope you'll be at that table with us.

St. Peter's Potluck is almost always on the fourth Sunday of the month. Upcoming potlucks will be on January 27, February 24, March 24, and April 28.



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#### Emergency Services District#10

Please join the ESD in congratulating Matthew Selby of the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department for passing the arduous training and testing necessary to become a State Certified Fire Inspector. Mark Moellenberg, fire chief for the Thrall Volunteer Fire Department, is also a State Certified Fire Inspector. The ESD will be paying tuition for two more firefighters to attend the school during the coming year.

The Coupland fire station now has an Ops-Cad program that is shown on several screens and laptops within the station which allows the firefighters to see a list and map of every emergency call throughout the ESD service area.

The Coupland and Thrall volunteers have taken part in training classes for wild land fires, vehicle rescue, and extrication. They also participated in a game of dodge ball while wearing their full bunker gear.

As part of their ongoing fire prevention program, the Coupland volunteers had Liberty Hill Fire Department Clown Brigade present a program at the Coupland School. They were asked to perform again during the next school year. The Coupland volunteers also presented a program at the Coupland School Harvest Fest where they ran the children through a "smoke house" provided by the Taylor Volunteer Fire Department. Both events were well received.

The Thrall volunteers have been supplying the Thrall schools with "Stop the Bleed" kits. They will furnish each classroom and each school bus with a kit. Once they have furnished the schools in Thrall, they will begin providing the kits to the Coupland School.

The ESD has instituted a \$20,000 Group Term Life Insurance Policy for each of the Coupland and Thrall volunteer firefighters and ESD Commissioners. Their volunteer work is much appreciated and otherwise uncompensated.

The Thrall Department has received a grant from the Texas Forest Service that will reimburse them for fire equipment purchased through April 2019. They will be able to replace worn equipment and tools with the funds. And the Coupland Department received a grant of \$10,761 that will reimburse them for the purchase of bunker gear. The average cost for a coat and pair of pants is \$1,800, so they will be able to replace worn and/or out-of-date bunker gear with the grant monies.



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#### Big Exciting Change Coming For Free Churches in Type and Elgin By Charlene Hanson Jordan

In just a few Sundays, the two Evangelical Free Churches in Type and Elgin will re-combine their efforts. From 1908 to 1954, Type and Kimbro shared a pastor and then they joined each other to form the Elgin Evangelical Free Church. Now they will again share pastors. This time, it will be under the names of the Yegua Creek Evangelical Free Church at Type and the Elgin Evangelical Free Church.

That pastor is Terry (Terrence) Kennedy. He, together with his wife, Rachel, serves the Elgin Evangelical Free Church. The times are being coordinated so that Sunday morning services will be held, one after the other, at both Type (Yegua Creek EFC) and Elgin while the rest of the pastor's week will be split between the two churches. The good news is

that Pastor Terry will devote full-time to the Lord's ministry. It will be like going from one room to the next to deliver an exciting message.

Pastor Terry was born to a Royal Canadian Air Force physician in Zweibrucken, Germany. That physician, Pediatrician Douglas Kennedy, and his wife, Eila, a nurse and descendant of Finns, settled in Houston, Texas. Both of them passed away in 2017, one month apart. Their son, Pastor Terry, attended the University of Houston and graduated from Dallas Theological Seminary.

Pastor Terry was ordained in the Southern Baptist church and also, meeting the strict requirements of the Evangelical Free Church, he was ordained there as well.

The Evangelical Free Church of America was founded by Scandinavians in Iowa in 1884. The Evangelical Free Church espouses unity in what is important and harmony in what is secondary. The denomination was an off-shoot of the Lutheran church that found a happy middle ground between Baptists and Lutherans. Being part of a traditional diocese or governing body offers assurance that a pastor stays within the boundaries of that belief instead of potentially going off in a different direction.

Pastor Terry and his wife, Rachel (a New Jersey native, but Texan since she was 17), have been married for thirty-three years. They have two grown children who have children of their own. Daughter Laura (31) is a supervising nurse in Austin at St. David's South, Cardiac Critical Care. Their son, Douglas (29), works in Workers Comp for Texas Mutual Insurance Company.

Pastor Terry has served as a minister for many years and he has additional special background showing empathy and love for others in his having worked for two years with troubled youth at the Giddings Correctional Facility. He categorized it as a wonderful ministry to help these unfortunate young people aged 14 to 18 who were in the correctional facility for everything from sex crimes to murder. Pastor Terry spent time and effort on the other end of the spectrum as well, by uplifting people at the end of life by working for two years as a hospice minister for Cameron Standards Home Health Care.

Yegua Creek Evangelical Free Church welcomes Pastor Terry and his wife, Rachel, as we bid farewell to Pastor Paul who will soon return to his family in Virginia.

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## Letitia Eldredge To Be Featured In Ornette Coleman Book . . .

Coupland artist Letitia Eldredge was a friend of jazz great Ornette Coleman. Coleman was a jazz saxophonist, violinist, trumpeter, and composer. He was a founder in the 1960's of free jazz, inventing the term for his album *Free Jazz: A Collective Improvisation*. He received the 2007 Pulitzer Prize for music for his album *Sound Grammar*.

Letitia's drawing of the Fort Worth house that Coleman grew up in will be used in an upcoming book about Coleman. The book is by Maria Golia; the author was General Manager at Fort Worth's Caravan of Dreams when Coleman and Letitia were both featured artists there during the 1980's. Letitia says, "I am honored that my art is included. Ornette was a Fort Worth native. We had this in common, as well as a mentoring friendship when times permitted." Coleman was born in Fort Worth in 1930.

Letitia drew the house before she knew Coleman and before she knew that it was his family's house. She explains, "The little drawing? I did it in 1961 as a high school student



out on a solo exploratory sketch trip in my '57 Chevy. That I saw it and drew it was pure coincidence."

She explains, "Ornette Coleman's homestead was identified by his son Denardo Coleman as 'my Grandma's house' and Ornette himself in 1985

while we were all in-house artists at the Caravan of Dreams."

The Caravan of Dreams was a performing arts center in central Fort Worth that was active in the 1980's and 1990's. Founded by Ed Bass, it featured new forms of music, theater, dance, poetry, and film. The opening celebration centered around performances by Coleman and coincided with the mayoral proclamation of September 29, 1983, as "Ornette Coleman Day." The venue closed in 2001.

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#### ... and Adds Local History Books to Archive

Letitia has an archive of art books and journals that she makes available to interested readers. Friends and art collectors who come from out of town to visit and view her artwork often ask her about the history of our area, so she is adding books to her library about Coupland history. She was recently presented with two books for her collection by Jim "Kicker" Garry. He is a native of our area but lives in Wyoming. His two books—*This Ol' Drought Ain't Broke Us Yet* and *The First Liar Never Has a Chance*—include stories about our area's history as well as stories about the West. The books are important additions to Letitia's art and history archive.

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
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










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#### Map of the Coupland Water Supply Corp.--See Article on Page 13



#### Coupland Water Supply Corp.--Flushing Unacceptable Items Will Cause Rate Increase

First, I'd like to thank Cindy Wood for serving on the board of the CWSC for the last three years. And I'd like to welcome Daniel Noji as our newest board member. Daniel moved to Coupland from Delaware last year, and he joined the board when Cindy's term ended. Thanks to you both! The wastewater system could not operate without volunteers like you.

Second, I need to explain a serious problem we're having with our wastewater system. In recent months, some customers have been flushing unacceptable items like diapers, wet wipes, shop rags, blue mechanic towels, underwear, and cigarette butts down their toilets. Our wastewater system simply cannot handle these items. If this does not stop, your wastewater bill will increase.

Here is a map of the CWSC area (map to left, on page 12). If your property is inside the dotted line, you have access to the CWSC wastewater system. If your property is outside the dotted line, you're probably on a septic system. If your property is inside one of the areas marked off by the solid dark lines, that means your property is serviced by a "lift station" that transfers your wastewater to the treatment plant on FM 1466. Whether your property is inside the dotted line or inside one of the lift station areas, please make sure you properly dispose of the unacceptable items listed above. Please speak to your family and your neighbors about it, too.

Let's all do our part to keep our wastewater rates low and our quality of life high in Coupland!

#### New Developments On Solar Farm Just West of Coupland ETJ

There has been renewed activity on the 940-acre solar farm on Manda-Carlson Road, just west of Coupland, just outside of the Coupland extraterritorial jurisdiction (ETJ). The solar farm is in the Pflugerville ETJ, and Pflugerville has renewed an agreement with RRE Solar to extend the construction deadline for another year and to prohibit Pflugerville from annexing the solar farm for 35 years.

The project broke ground in 2010, but did not proceed. It is now planned to be finished by the end of 2020.

As reported by the Austin Statesman, Austin Solar CEO Daven Mehta said they had previously been unable to get a buyer for their energy. However, in November, Austin Energy agreed to purchase power for 15 years from Recurrent Energy, the overseer of the solar farm. The completed solar farm is supposed to provide 144 megawatts of energy to power more than 23,000 homes. The project may provide 250 jobs during construction and two full-time, permanent jobs during operation.

The Blackland Prairie Concerned Citizens Association is trying to arrange for Mehta to speak to residents during the first part of this year to give them more details.

#### RCR Taylor Logistics Park

Projected to open this summer, RCR Taylor Logistics Park is a large project--750 acres located on Highway 79 at FM 3349. It is not too close to Coupland, but considering the impacts on neighboring areas and on traffic, it is something to be aware of.

RCR is a logistics and industrial park with service by Union Pacific and BNSF, providing switching, transload, and storage services. Their brochure states: "Direct access to Texas SH 79, Texas SH 130 Toll Road, Interstate 35 and two Class 1 rail carriers provides unmatched access to Central, South and North Texas; ideally located between the D/FW Metroplex and Mexico." It will receive cars from Union Pacific and BNSF's inbound and outbound mainline service, offering manifest switching, unit train services, transload, storage and other rail service to customers.

RCR would go over Hutto's water lines. Also RCR is near the proposed Southeast Corridor highway. It is possible

that the RCR project will be delayed because of the water lines and the highway issues, and conversely the highway could be delayed because of RCR. Some have speculated that the December 10 open house on the Southeast Corridor Study was postponed in part because of this conflict. No new date has been set yet.




