# City of Coupland News--By Mayor Jack Piper

City Council meetings are held the second Thursday of each month beginning at 6 p.m. in the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department Meeting Room. Please see the City of Coupland Website at **http://www.cityofcouplandtx.us** for copies of the Agendas and Minutes of previous Council meetings. Feedback is always welcomed.

Since the last Herald, the following items were discussed by the City Council.

The City Council is continuing to review a Nuisance Ordinance for the City. It is specific and will help make Coupland a clean and welcoming community.

A lengthy complaint was recently received from concerned citizens. Some of the issues addressed in their complaint are also stated in the Texas Health and Safety Code.

### A public nuisance is:

(1) keeping, storing, or accumulating refuse on premises in a neighborhood unless the refuse is entirely contained in a closed receptacle;

(2) keeping, storing, or accumulating rubbish, including newspapers, abandoned **vehicles**, refrigerators, stoves, furniture, tires, and cans, on premises in a neighborhood or within 300 feet of a public street for 10 days or more, unless the rubbish or object is completely enclosed in a building or is not visible from a public street;

(3) maintaining premises in a manner that creates an unsanitary condition likely to attract or harbor mosquitoes, rodents, vermin, or other disease-carrying pests;

(4) allowing weeds to grow on premises in a neighborhood if the weeds are located within 300 feet of another residence or commercial establishment;

(5) maintaining a building in a manner that is structurally unsafe or constitutes a hazard to safety, health, or public welfare because of inadequate maintenance, unsanitary conditions, dilapidation, obsolescence, disaster, damage, or abandonment or because it constitutes a fire hazard.

We have tried to assist residents with their cleanup by sponsoring clean up days. Dumpsters were available for residents' use. This endeavor has failed. Following the adoption of a Nuisance Ordinance, the City will take appropriate actions for residents who fail to comply.

# Coupland School Bonds Pass

On November 5, Coupland Independent School District voters passed \$5,000,000 in bonds; this was the first bond proposal in the history of Coupland School. It passed with 124 (63.27%) voting for it and 72 (36.73%) voting against. Previously, the school was able to finance expansion of their facilities using careful management, operating funds, and a one-time grant from the state. However, expected population growth and increased security requirements resulted in the need for a bond election.

Our *Coupland Herald* newsletter is named for a weekly newspaper published in our community about 120 years ago. The current *Herald* was founded in 2001 by Dana Smith, its first editor, who had the vision to realize the value of a newsletter to Coupland and the energy to carry it through. Susan Garry, the current editor, became editor in January 2003.

It's hard to realize that the *Herald* is entering its 20<sup>th</sup> year. The *Herald* has endured for so long because of the support of the community. Thank you to all the authors who contribute articles and the photographers who contribute photos. A special thank you to our advertisers. Without their support, we could not print and mail the *Herald*. Other than the advertising revenue used for printing and mailing, the *Herald* is a totally volunteer effort. A current advertiser is Jay Sutton, who is the financial advisor at Edward Jones in Elgin. Jay was the very first advertiser in the *Herald*; his first ad is in the second issue, June 2001, and he has been an advertiser ever since! Thank you Jay!

The *Herald* is mailed to every address in our 78615 zip code, about 600 addresses. It is also mailed to about 100 people outside of our zip code who have asked to receive it. Another 200 are hand-delivered to Coupland School, Old Coupland Inn, St. Peter's Church, New Sweden Church, the tive civic-minded entity. In the 1970's, the Club restored the depot, purchased the first fire truck, and established a volunteer fire department. 1987 was the 100<sup>th</sup> birthday of Coupland, which was celebrated by dropping \$100 bills and one hundred \$1 bills from a helicopter which flew over the town.

In the January 2002 issue of the *Herald*, an article appeared about Animal Control in Williamson County and specifically about "dumping" unwanted animals. I wish I could say this issue has been resolved but unfortunately, it's still as bad if not worse in some areas of the county. East of Coupland seems to be the place where people dump their unwanted animals. It is a very cruel practice which doesn't even have to take place. You can call Animal Control to pick up unwanted pets or you can take them to the various animal shelters in the area. The puppies, kittens, and older dogs who are discarded in such a heartless way are simply prey for coyotes and feral pigs. If you have a dog or puppies or kittens you cannot afford, take them to a shelter.

I encourage everyone in the area to attend our CCO meetings which are held the last Monday of the month. Food is always served at 6:30 p.m. and the programs start at 7. It's a great time to reconnect with your neighbors and get to know people in our community. I hope to see you at our next meeting.


Annual Congregational Meeting was Sunday, January 12. Voted on new Church Council members and Committee members, reviewed annual committee reports, and reviewed the new church budget.

### We've been Cooking this Chili since 1980. Annual Chili Supper Saturday, February 29, from 5 p.m. at the Coupland Fire Station

We look forward to welcoming y'all to this year's Chili Supper, which is on the last Saturday in February. We've been cooking chili since 1980 and we're getting pretty good at it. Every year we host between 100 and 200 people and it is the highlight of our year. Everyone is welcome.

As well as our signature chili (available in Mild, Medium and 3-Alarm), we serve desserts and iced tea. In addition we have an auction, fire truck tours, outdoor games and a raffle drawing.

Volunteer Fire Departments depend on this type of fundraising to operate. Your donations go towards training, equipment and other firefighting and community fire safety initiatives.

### 2019 Calls for Service

In 2019 we received 427 calls for service, a little down from 457 in 2018 and up from 406 in 2017. We respond to calls with our 100% volunteer staff of 15 firefighters.

### Starting 2020 with a Ton of Training

Our team is starting the 2020s with an impressive list of training.

In our first in-house training session of the new decade we took the jaws of life to a Mazda 6 for vehicle extrication training. Thank you to Randy's Wrecker in Taylor for hauling what was left of the car away.

In February we have students and instructors at the annual Fire Academy for state firefighter certification, while in March six of our firefighters are giving up three weekends in a

As many of you know, the century-old iron truss bridge crossing Brushy Creek on CR 456 just northeast of Coupland had been closed for 5 long years. It officially reopened for vehicular traffic on October 14, 2019. With the long and wonderful legacy of this historically significant bridge, it is great to have it put back in service.

You may recall, that the now famous Brown and Root Company built the bridge in 1912, and there are many generations of friends and neighbors who fostered fond memories of the bridge over the years. Once this type of truss bridge was very common throughout Texas but now, according to the Texas Department of Transportation's culture resources department, there are very few such bridges remaining in service. We, as a community, can be justly proud of having one of these historic bridges here.

A special vote of thanks goes out to the many supporters who came forward back in 2014 signing the petition and offering comments as to why the bridge should be kept in service. Likewise, we are thankful that the Coupland City Council passed a supporting

Steve Schiller sent photos and said, "We had some visitors last fall [2018]." Glenn Schiller commented, "They are very possibly pelicans. Looks like them to me. There is a small lake over on CR 139 south of Hutto where the pelicans came and covered the entire lake."

Sheri Pagel also sent photos and noted, "There has been a family of three to seven pelicans visiting our

School Bonds Pass

The school plans to add three new standard classrooms and one new Pre-Kindergarten classroom. Existing portable buildings will be replaced with two standard and two specialty classrooms. Security features will be added, such as enclosed connecting corridors and a secure entrance. 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# 150-Year-Old Foundry That Has Always Made Texas Historical Markers Has Gone Out of Business--Historical Marker for Post Oak Island Is in Limbo

People have been putting up markers ever since it became important for them to remember something about a place, a person, or an event. Monuments, statues, tombstones, memorials, rock drawings, rune stones, buildings, are among them. It might also be a sign identifying a place, like Andre Jordan's work on the Type Cemetery sign. He carved the letters from a soft wood and sent them to the Southwell Foundry to be cast in iron. Then he mounted them in an attractive frame and it stands at the entrance to the cemetery. See photo at right.

The Official Texas Historical Marker program started in 1962 and approximately 1600 markers have been placed along Texas roadsides and other sites. The marker program is administered by the Texas Historical Commission.

Travis Jordan and I are responsible for the Williams-Buck Cemetery Marker near Liberty Hill and the Type Cemetery Marker. I submitted an application for a Post Oak Island marker and it has been approved, but has not yet been fabricated by a foundry, despite the almost \$2,000 fee paid by Trey Smith almost a year ago.

The reason it hasn't been finished is that the more than 150-year-old foundry went out of business. The Southwell Company in San Antonio had fabricated all 1600-plus markers until a family feud led to a lawsuit and then to the sale of the company.

The Texas Historical Commission is possibly in a bind, because all of the Texas markers have been produced by the Southwell Company using a process that another company may not be able to reproduce on the same terms.

Trey Smith paid about \$2,000 for the marker on February 5, 2019, about a year ago. Trey is a direct descendant of


Sam Smith, an early member of the Post Oak Island Masonic Lodge and original resident of what is now Lawhon Springs. Trey is responsible for restoring the Lawhon Springs School building and turning it into a museum (www.lawhonspringsmuseum.com), which we covered in the August 2019 *Herald*.

The company started in 1866 when it produced stencils for wool and cotton shipments. George Southwell purchased it in 1914 when it was manufacturing rubber stamps. In 1936, Wilson Southwell helped create the Texas Centennial markers' bronze stars and wreaths with Gutzon Borglum (Mount Rushmore) according to an article "The Marker Maker's Marker" in the Winter 2016 issue of *The Medallion*.

The company was being operated by the brothers, Scott and Billy Southwell. The trouble started when their sister, Deborah, and their father accused them in court of fraud when they allegedly persuaded their parents, under duress, to turn the business over to them. The suit was settled, but the company was sold to a Corpus Christi firm.

The THC still has not found a company to produce the markers. Thus, the Post Oak Island marker, although approved, is in limbo. It will be placed near the Type Cemetery marker because the cemetery as well as the Yegua Creek Church are near the heart of Post Oak Island. The date for the installation of the marker and its dedication will be announced.

# Williamson County ESD #10

The Emergency Services District has retired all of the debt related to vehicles. They have two open grants in place with the Texas Forest Service for both a large and a small engine. As they age, there are more repairs and maintenance necessary to keep the existing vehicles operational.

There is a new House Bill that requires every school in Texas to have Stop the Bleed kits on hand and provide training for the upper grades. The Thrall Volunteer Fire Department has already provided the kits to each class and each bus in their ISD. The ESD will be purchasing required chest seals which were not included in the original kits. The ESD has ordered ten Stop the Bleed kits for the Coupland ISD.

Both the Thrall Volunteer Fire Department and Coupland Volunteer Fire Department have hosted fire prevention training at their respective schools. Coupland borrowed a "smoke house" in September which is a small house on a trailer that the students pass through to experience a smoke-filled house.

The two fire departments have been training on wild land firefighting, communications protocol, hose deployment, catching hydrants, and pump operations. The Williamson County Fire Chiefs Association will be conducting Countywide training in the future. Three volunteers have passed the necessary training and testing to become certified fire fighters. There has been an increase in medical calls over the past several months and Thrall has personnel training for EMS credentials.

The Coupland station needs repairs to the bay doors and the air conditioning unit in the dormitory area.

The Thrall volunteers have purchased some new bunker gear. It costs about \$800 each for new bunker gear for fire fighters. The two fire departments also purchased two new mandated radios for each of the fire chiefs. The radios will be required by the State and additional radios are in line to be purchased before the requirement deadline.

Sons of Hermann Life Coupland hosted a bake sale for the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department which generated much-needed funds. The department and the ESD appreciate their continued support.



Greetings Coupland! Here's news from the Coupland Water Supply Corporation (or CWSC). The CWSC, as you know, is the town's wastewater management system. The CWSC works closely with Manville Water to make sure that your water and wastewater needs are met in Coupland, Texas.

- ✓ There are three "lift stations" in Coupland that transfer wastewater to the treatment plant on 1466. In March of 2019, after nearly 20 years, because of equipment failures that were costing us thousands of dollars, we upgraded the equipment at that lift station. Moving forward, we're planning to upgrade the equipment at the other two lift stations in a phased approach. Again, please do not flush inappropriate materials down your toilets, including brown paper towels, blue cleaning towels, underwear, feminine products, and cigarette butts. This kind of irresponsible behavior costs all of us.
- Please check out the new logo for CWSC (see above). The logo was designed for CWSC at no charge by one of our residents. Thank you, Jessica Mason!
