City Council meetings are held the second Thursday of each month beginning at 6 p.m. in the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department Meeting Room. Since the last Herald, the following items were discussed by the City Council.

1. Our last Council meeting was in March. We elected to cancel the April meeting due to COVID-19. We have yet to determine if there will be a May meeting. During this uncertain time, we are cognizant of the measures to halt the spread of the coronavirus and will continue to follow orders placed by the County Judge and by the Governor.

2. During the March meeting we discussed the necessity of having dumpster(s) available during the summer. As you recall, we had several tires dumped along with items dumped before and after hours. Thanks to several local citizens, we were able to restack the items into the dumpsters so they would be picked up. The company will not pick up any dumpster if trash and debris is over the top. Of course, tires are not allowed and should never be left inside or adjacent to the dumpsters.

3. Speaking of the tires that were left after the dumpsters had been picked up, including several additional ones: a big thank you goes to Tony Morgan, AKA "Tony the Tire Man." He volunteered and donated his time and cost for getting rid of the tires. THANKS, TONY!!!

How Coupland VFD Is Responding in a COVID-19 World

Firstly, we'd like to say thank you to all the residents of our corner of Williamson County. We've all been dealing with the type of public health restrictions not seen here in living memory. The restrictions brought in by Williamson County and the adherence to them by our residents have helped keep the number of COVID-19 cases in the county relatively low. Great work.

By the middle of March we'd already seen fire departments in other parts of the country suffering problems due to large numbers of staff being quarantined. From March 12 onwards we implemented several measures to protect our volunteers, with the aim of ensuring we could continue providing service to the residents of our district.

We split our volunteer firefighters into two branches, Fire response and Medical response. As the names suggest one branch is tasked with responding to medical calls, the other to fire calls. We replaced our weekly training meetings with online video calls and adopted a strict "don't feel well, stay home" policy. The annual fire academy in which we participate (alongside Weir, Thrall, and Taylor VFDs) has also moved its instruction online. All of this has been done with the aim of compartmentalizing our operations and reducing the risk of any possible COVID infection spreading throughout the department and impacting our ability to respond.

In our response to medical calls we operate under Dr. Jarvis, Williamson County EMS Medical Director. Wilco EMS quickly introduced a number of new protocols for Fire Departments, designed to protect patients and first responders. These include additional PPE and changing the way we interact with patients. Our community is fortunate to be served by the excellent Wilco Paramedics; for this area they are based in Taylor and southeast Hutto. Coupland VFD will continue providing support to this team with our EMTs and firefighters.

We look forward to weathering this storm along with y'all. Our dedicated 100% volunteer team will be there when you need us. We look forward to being able to resume our regular in-person Thursday night training and being able to interact with our whole team in person again, hopefully before too many more weeks have passed.

Type Church--New Name Of Yegua Creek EFC

The Yegua Creek Evangelical Free Church congregation voted unanimously to change the church name to Type Church on March 8, 2020.

What's in a name? In the case of the church at Type, "Yegua Creek" showed history, not location. The first congregation led by Pastor Mark Nygard had met in the Lawhon Springs School from December 1984 to December 1987. That location was close to the Yegua Creek.

The Yegua Creek EFC set up their church on the other side of the Type Cemetery from where the original 1908 Type Free Mission Church had stood. The earlier Type congregation had joined with the Kimbro Free Church to form the Elgin Free Church in 1954 and the location next to the cemetery had been abandoned.

As the years went by, the first meeting place of the Yegua Creek congregation went from a Camp Swift barracks to a 300-seat sanctuary dedicated in 1996. It was built with the help of the TBM (retired Texas Baptist Men), average age 71.

Pastor Terry Kennedy and his wife Rachel serve the Type Church. They and the congregation heartily welcome everyone to join them.



Williamson County Emergency Services District #10

Amid the coronavirus precautions, the Emergency Services District (ESD) will hold future Board Meetings by telephone conferencing. The approved minutes and meeting notice/agenda will be posted on the ESD's new website at www.wcesd10.org.

The Williamson County Dispatch operators are screening all medical calls for possible infections of any kind. This will allow the medical team to arrive with the necessary personal protective gear for themselves and their patients.

The Coupland and Thrall Volunteer Fire Departments have established an Emergency Response Protocol for the virus. They have divided their small departments into a medical response team and a firefighting team in order to prevent the spread of the virus and to protect the volunteers from unnecessary exposure that could reduce their staff.

The ESD has entered into a Purchasing Cooperative Interlocal Agreement with Williamson County for the purchase of goods, services, and materials under each party's competitively bid contracts.

The State of Texas has mandated an upgrade of the radios used by the fire departments by 2022. Both fire chiefs for the Coupland and Thrall Volunteer Fire Departments have one of the new radios which cost about \$8,000 each. The ESD is in hopes of filing with the County for a grant next year that would help the ESD with the cost of purchasing new radios for all fire fighters as required.

The fire departments have written a Response Protocol for active shooter incidents. Additional supplies have been added to the Stop-the-Bleed kits provided to the Thrall and Coupland schools. The school staff will receive training regarding the use of these kits in the event of an emergency. The kits will be a valuable asset in the event of other injuries as well.



The volunteer fire fighters have been training on vehicle extraction, wildland fire in Burton, Texas, and emergency medical response. The grain bin rescue training scheduled for April 2020 has been cancelled at this time. There have been a number of volunteers who have completed training at the Fire Academy.

A budget priority for this year is continuing to provide repairs and maintenance to the vehicle fleets for the two departments. Worn tires have been replaced and repairs made to various vehicles on a rotating basis. Coupland's Engine Two is currently experiencing a steering problem although the vehicle is still operable. That engine will be sent in for repairs in the near future. Both Coupland and Thrall departments have been able to share vehicles as necessary.

As for building repairs and maintenance, Coupland has repaired issues with the station's bay doors, the air conditioning unit, and plumbing. Thrall is in need of a lighting upgrade in the truck bay that has been put on hold for the present.



Before the program, CCO board members hosted a supper of Southwestern casseroles and homemade desserts.


