As is stated in each *Herald*, the City Council meetings are held the second Thursday of each month. Beginning time has been changed to 5 p.m. in the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department Meeting Room. Please remember that copies of the Agendas and Minutes from all Council Meetings can be found on the City's website, http://www.cityofcouplandtx.us.

Coupland's **CLEAN-UP DAY** has been scheduled for Saturday, June 12. Location will be the same (beside the railroad tracks in downtown Coupland). More information will be posted prior to the actual date so residents will be aware of acceptable and unacceptable items along with opening and closing times. We will have four dumpsters this year to assist residents with their late spring and early summer clean-up.

Right-of-way issues have been discussed at the last several council meetings. Most of the streets in "old town Coupland" (the original Coupland townsite) are 80-foot streets with the exceptions being North Main and Broad being 100 feet and Commerce being 150 feet. It has become increasingly difficult to mow the right-of-way on city streets because of vehicles, trailers, boats, etc. parked on city property. Prior to action being taken, letters will be sent to all residents informing them of any position the council may choose to take.

Road issues continue to be a problem. We have discussed issues with the road repair people and they will patch potholes on CR 458 as well as fill in edges of the road to hopefully mitigate the loss of pavement. Murray and South Broad Streets are on the schedule for Williamson County, and we anticipate the project to begin soon. It is also noteworthy that existing culverts will be replaced.

Speaking of road issues and culverts, there are several within the city limits that are needing attention. A request has been submitted for reputable companies to do this type of work.

At our March 11 council meeting, council unanimously passed the Interlocal Agreement between the City of Coupland and Williamson County for Fire Code and Investigations.

Please contact us or one of your council members for questions and answers. We certainly look forward to a better 2021.



Acceptable items: non-hazardous household trash and reasonable amounts of remodeling debris, lumber, and glass. If possible, please break down larger items, such as furniture. Unacceptable items: hazardous waste, such as industrial and agricultural chemicals, pesticides and other poisons, petroleum products, vehicle batteries, tires, flammable substances, and paint (empty paint cans with lids off are OK). Appliances and air conditioners must have had the Freon recaptured; refrigerators must be free of coolant and must have the door off.

Mattresses are unacceptable! The dumpster company will not take them.

Please take advantage of this opportunity provided by the City to clear trash from property and make Coupland a neat and clean community.

Post Oak Island Historical Marker To Be Dedicated Next Year at Type By Charlene Hanson Jordan

The Texas Historical Commission's newly-cast historical marker for Post Oak Island will be placed near the Type Cemetery marker. They complement each other and it will be easy to stop to read the text on each. The dedication is tentatively set for April 23, 2022 (one year from now); the ceremony will probably take place inside the Type Church. There should also be a new book about the societal changes at Post Oak Island.

The Type Church and the Type Cemetery are located on land that used to belong to Jesse Bailey. The Bailey family came to Milam County, Texas, in 1835, from Alabama. Jesse's sister, Celete, married the surveyor, Thomas A. Graves, in 1837. The Graves grant at Post Oak Island was 3,409 acres. It was property that had been awarded Graves for his service in the Texas Revolution.

Graves, the surveyor and owner of the grant at Post Oak Island, was also the first sheriff of Milam County before Williamson County was formed out of Milam. So, Graves was the sheriff of a vast territory that included our area.

In 1837, Graves started marketing part of the land by going into partnership with O. B. Smith (ancestor of the Jarmon family from Elgin and the area), and a couple of others. Jesse, too, would own land on Graves' survey in 1837, but he never lived on it because he died a short time later in a massacre at Post Oak Springs, now called Ad Hall in Milam County. He was part of a small ranger force at Little River Fort when he and four others were ambushed by Comanche. Their slaughtered bodies were found on the prairie near a grove of post oaks.

Graves, himself, would die in 1841. His widow, Celete, married Ibry Jasper Kidd in 1849 and they moved to Post Oak Island in about 1855. I. J. Kidd was the moving force behind the thriving community: postmaster, storekeeper, and Masonic Lodge founder (Post Oak Island No. 181, now at Beaukiss). This pro-Confederate society would last until the Civil War when the community more or less disintegrated. The railroad's bypassing Post Oak Island in favor of Coupland also contributed to the changes.

Jesse Bailey's heirs deeded Jesse's property at Type to his sister, Celete, on July 27, 1875. The Kidds had moved to Comanche County and the property went through a couple of transactions until it was purchased by Peder K. Nygaard and his wife. The Nygaards deeded about an acre and a half to the Swedish Free Mission Church and its cemetery at Type in 1908. The church eventually became an Evangelical Free Church which in the 1950s joined with the Kimbro Free Church and the congregation moved to Elgin. Mark Nygard moved the Yegua Creek congregation to the adjacent property in the 1980s.

The church on the land that belonged to the ill-fated Jesse Bailey has gone through a name change to Type Church and its pastor is Terrence Kennedy. It is at 1200 County Road 466. The services, socially distanced, are at 10:30 every Sunday.

Coupland designer and sculptor Wells Mason has been named to the Board of Directors of the Texas Sculpture Group (TSG), a non-profit arts organization that promotes contemporary sculpture, educates the public regarding the aesthetics of sculpture, and promotes and supports sculptors in Texas and beyond.

According to the TSG announcement, "He has already made a huge impact with his enthusiasm and work for the TSG! You know his work from previous TSG shows (the Umasi tables!)." Wells is a multi-faceted artist who works in wood and metal. He has exhibited his work in galleries and museums around the country, and his work has been featured in countless regional, national, and international publications. Recently he was selected for the 2020 Edition of the London International Creative Competition in the Product Category for The Umasi Collection.

He has a long history of public service. He is the immediate past president of the Coupland Water Supply Corporation, and he currently serves on the board of the Huntington Sculpture Foundation in addition to the Texas Sculpture Group. His most recent community project challenges architects from around the world to imagine a hopeful, postpandemic future for everyone.

Due to the Governor having rescinded the COVID restrictions, the ESD will begin holding future Board Meetings in person at the Coupland Fire Station. The approved minutes, meeting notice/agenda and audited financial report are posted on the ESD's website at www.wcesd10.org.

Mark Prinz has been elected the Assistant Treasurer of the Williamson County ESD #10.

The ESD #10 was able to secure CARES Act reimbursement for the coronavirus-related purchases. They recently submitted about \$1,700 for reimbursement through the Act.

Both the Coupland and Thrall Volunteer Fire Departments have seen an increase in coronavirus dispatch calls with a younger population contracting the virus. The Thrall and Coupland Volunteer Fire Departments are sending only certified volunteers on medical calls. Both departments have initiated strict mask policies during the pandemic. They have also experienced a rise in other non-medical calls.

The ESD #10 Commissioners have established an Advisory Committee for the Ignis Fire Academy. The Committee members are John Roulston-Bates, Lead Instructor, Coupland VFD Asst. Fire Chief; Kevin Gehrig, Instructor, Weir Fire Department Asst. Fire Chief; Zach Hall, Instructor, Thrall VFD Asst. Fire Chief; Drew Neal, Advisor, Training Captain, Hutto Fire Department; and Charlie Frymire, Advisor, Weir Fire Department Fire Chief. Classes for the Ignis Fire Academy began on March 22 with eleven students who will train until May 5, 2021.

Hank Jones, the Williamson County Fire Marshall, visited with the Board of Commissioners and reported Wilco has adopted a new Fire Code which both the Coupland and Thrall Volunteer Fire Departments will follow.

Repairs have been made to several of the fire trucks belonging to the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department which have been necessary due to their age and usage. The Thrall Volunteer Fire Department vehicles are fully operational.

The Board of Commissioners met for a Strategic Planning Work Session in April to plan for the next five years, including extreme weather preparations.





- 8th Grade Graduation will be held on Thursday, May 27, at 7 p.m. in the Gym (COVID permitting).


School Construction and Personalized Bricks


