What's Happening in the City?

As has been previously stated, the City Council meetings are held the second Thursday of each month beginning at 6 p.m. at the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department's Meeting Room. Copies of the Agendas and Minutes from all Council Meetings can be found on the City's website, http://www.cityofcouplandtx.us.

The City Council reviewed and ratified the November 2, 2021, election results for Mayor (Jack Piper), and two Alderwomen (Susan Garry and Karen Marosko). All of the aforementioned were subsequently sworn in by LaVerne Rohlack, City Secretary.

Patching potholes has been an ongoing and will be an ongoing subject for the future. Some of the problem areas in "old town" Coupland were patched: Taylor, Elliott, Hoxie, Austin. CR 458 continues to have many problems; the contractor who has previously done work for the city has been contacted.

The Muery/South Broad project continues to be "on hold" until Manville WSC completes replacing old pipes on South Broad (being done to bring the line

up to current standards). It is the City's understanding that Manville's project is to begin in February. This of course means that the city's much anticipated road project has once again been delayed. We have learned that the start date has now been pushed to May, 2022.


Happy New Year to all!

They had stables in the back of the school property for students who rode horses to school. His pony was so well trained that he would get off the pony at the front of the school and loosen the girth. The pony would then make its way by himself to the stables. At the end of the school day, the pony would walk to the front of the school where my dad would tighten the girth and head home. He always claimed he never had muddy feet at school.

All my siblings and I attended Coupland School. I graduated from eighth grade with a grand total of four students in my class. One of those students happened to be the father of Kyle Rinderknecht, present coach at the school. Unfortunately, of the four students, I am the only surviving member. I have so many good memories. I only had three teachers during my eight years at Coupland School. Mrs. Gretchen Pfluger (also my godmother) was my 1st and 2nd grade teacher. Camilla Dalton was my 3rd and 4th grade teacher and decided to move up to the next grades; so, she was also my 5th

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Historic Manda School Vandalized

The restoration of the historic 1915 two-room Manda schoolhouse west of Coupland on Manda Carlson Road has been disrupted by vandalism that destroyed several of the historic window frames and 106-year-old wavy glass panes.

Vandals came twice: first, the windows were destroyed and paint was thrown on the walls that were prepared for repainting. A few days later, the vandals returned and removed the plywood covering the previously destroyed windows and stole tools. They pushed over the antique upright piano, splintering the wood. Manda School is owned by a non-profit foundation, and all the work on it is through donations and by volunteers. It is heartbreaking that their efforts have been sabotaged.

Footprints found at the crime scene indicate youthful intruders who might have white paint on the bottoms of their tennis shoes. A four-wheeler was driven onto the porch, leaving identifying tire tracks there, and also in the parking area.

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
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St. Peter's Church News -- By Interim Pastor Charles Stark



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Changes Coming in 2022

As we all know, growth is coming to the area and things around here are likely to look quite different within just a few years. Seems like we'll see considerable development along US79, FM973, SH95 and within the surrounding communities. With the anticipated growth it is more important than ever that we in the fire department plan for the future.

With this in mind, towards the end of last year the memberships of Coupland and Thrall VFDs voted unanimously to request the ESD#10 board approve a move of fire service into a single ESD#10 fire department. We anticipate that within 2022 we'll merge into one department within Williamson County ESD#10, with Coupland and Thrall stations.

In 2005 voters in the Coupland fire district voted to create Williamson County ESD#10, and in 2017 the voters in Thrall voted to join ESD#10. Since then the ESD has had responsibility for fire based emergency services, with Coupland and Thrall VFDs contracted to provide that service. The two VFDs have developed a close working relationship, with combined training and regularly back each other up on calls.

By combining into a single fire department, we'll move from two separate teams of 15 volunteer firefighters, to a single team of 30 working under a unified command structure. We'll be able to better adapt to the increasing call volume and operate more effectively.

The Coupland and Thrall Volunteer Fire Departments have been serving our communities for generations, as we move forward we want to honor that heritage whilst ensuring we're providing a 21st century level of service. The two VFDs will continue as support organizations, spearheading community fire safety projects; and you can be sure we'll be continuing to cook that chili... after 43 years we think we've just about got it right.

We'll still be a volunteer department and you'll still see the Coupland and Thrall patches on the trucks, alongside the Williamson County ESD#10 name.

50,000 lb. Baby Girl Expected Late Summer

We're delighted to announce that the ESD#10 board has approved the budget for a new 3,000-gallon water tender, to be built here in Central Texas. This will be the first new truck purchased since 2009.

As a rural fire department one of our biggest challenges is getting the water we need to our fire scenes. Within the city we have hydrants, but most of our territory is out in the country where the nearest hydrant could be a mile or more away. Our rural engines are designed with this in mind, where a typical city fire engine might only carry 500 gallons of water, Coupland's Engine 1 has a 1,500 gallon tank, but this still only gives us 5 - 10 minutes of water for a typical structure fire. Getting "big water" to our scenes quickly is essential, and something this new tender will allow us to do. We'll keep you updated as the truck gets built out and we add this important capability to our fleet.

News from ESD#10 By Maranda Cummings

Board Meetings are held in person at the Coupland Fire Station each second Tuesday of the month. The meetings are also available via telephone conferencing. This information is available each month on the notice posted at the Coupland Fire Station, Coupland Post Office, Citizens National Bank in Coupland, Thrall Fire Station, and Thrall Post Office. The approved minutes, meeting notice/agenda, and audited financial report are also posted on the ESD's website at www.wcesd10.org.

The Commissioners have decided to start paying the volunteer firefighters from Coupland and Thrall \$5 per response in recognition of their service to the community. The Active911 for Coupland and Thrall VFDs has been combined. This allows members from each department to receive calls for Williamson County ESD #10 and respond based on priority and proximity to the calls. Coupland and Thrall VFDs have been integrating their training with the merging of Active911 being a priority.

The Coupland and Thrall Departments will soon operate under the name "Williamson County ESD #10" to better serve the citizens. The timeline to complete the consolidation is between the end of Budget Year 2022 and the beginning of Budget Year 2023. The fire chiefs and assistant fire chiefs of Coupland and Thrall have been working on rebranding the departments to show this consolidation while still maintaining their individual identities. T-shirt designs, vehicle designs, and patch designs have been discussed. The t-shirts will likely include a Coupland or Thrall VFD patch on the front and "WCESD #10 Fire Department" on the back. The vehicle designs have included the station patches on the sides of the vehicles, and "Williamson County ESD #10" prominent at the top. The WCESD #10 patch design will likely be a Maltese cross design and replace the two shield designs of the Coupland and Thrall patches. The Commissioners have approved the purchase of a new tender costing up to \$325,000 which will be one of the first vehicles showcasing the new vehicle design.

If any of our area residents are interested in supporting our firefighters, they can contact Jared Cummings (Coupland VFD Fire Chief) about joining the Volunteer Auxiliary Unit. This unit aids the firefighters (e.g., bringing bottled water to calls or helping with the annual chili supper). Jared can be contacted at jcummings@couplandfire.org.

Antique Stained-Glass Windows In an Unlikely Place

Back in 1909, St. Mary's Church in Bremond was being built. For their beautiful new church, the congregation bought some exquisite stained-glass windows. The history is not certain, but the windows possibly came from Germany, producer of some of the best stained-glass windows in the world.

The 1909 church was torn down in 1971. When a new church was built, unbelievably the precious windows were not placed in the new church. They ended up as architectural salvage with Eugene Wukasch in Austin. He placed them in storage until he decided to sell them in about 2000. We can trace nine of the windows. Coincidentally, at this time, the new church of St. John Vianney was being built in Round Rock. A parishioner learned of the windows, and enough donations were gathered to buy six of them.

Nina Nygard of the Type Community saw the ad for the windows. Members of the church at Type (then Yegua Creek Church) thought that perhaps they could acquire some of these windows for their little church. They hoped that they could possibly get three and had to vote on purchasing them. Charlene Hanson Jordan says, "I remember the windows cost \$1600 each. The extended Jordan-Hanson-Jarmon-Eberstein family purchased the Mary window. The Ebersteins live in Germany and my cousin, Robert Leslie Jarmon, Jr., lived in Boerne, Texas. Another congregation member purchased the second window, and the congregation shared the cost of the third."


Charlene adds, "My friend Eugene Wukasch was the architect who installed the beautiful windows at Gethsemane Lutheran Church in Austin. Andre, my son, was working for him at that time. These St. Mary's windows were architectural salvage. Eugene sold them from the old Grove Drug Store in Austin."

St. Mary's in Bremond was a Polish congregation, and there are Polish words at the bottom of each of the three pictures. The pictures depict our Lord Jesus and the Blessed Virgin. The third picture seems to be a bishop and a saint because of his mitre and crozier and small pectoral cross. He hasn't been specifically identified.



So after a long trip, possibly from Germany, three of these vintage windows ended up lending their beauty to the Type Church. They are over 100 years old and are historic as well as beautiful. Unusual treasures for a small country church where they are loved and appreciated.











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
Coupland Students Win at Livestock Show
