News from the City--

By Mayor Jack Piper and Mayor Pro Tem Barbara Piper

Several things have taken place since the last *Herald* was published. Three persons for the position of aldermen were elected. The oath of office was administered during the November 17 council meeting. The aldermen sworn in are John Roulston-Bates, Russell Schmidt, and Barbara Piper. Also, during the November election, citizens of Coupland approved the sales and use tax rate so the tax rate will now be the same as other entities, 8.25%.

During the December meeting, the council voted to approve the creation of a Williamson County Municipal Utility District, approved the Resolution consenting to the Creation of a Municipal Utility District, approved an Ordinance for the annexation of approximately 26.207 acres and approving a Municipal Services Agreement, and approved a Resolution commencing the dis-annexation of approximately 20.906 acres. The developer, Barth Timmerman, was present along with his attorney, Josh Kahn, and his engineer, Matt Mitchell. The city's attorney, Paige Saenz and the city engineer Tony Prete were in attendance for the city and answered questions posed by council members prior to a vote. For those of you who may not have been following this development and discussions, it is located in the vicinity of CR 453 and Hwy 95.

School Bonds Fail

Coupland School's Board of Trustees placed a bond election on the November ballot for \$56 million to build facilities to address the growth at the Middle School. The student population has already outgrown the recent expansion of the school facilities. The bond failed in a close election. A total of 541 votes were cast in the election, with 262 for and 279 against.

Superintendent Tammy Brinkman said, "The Coupland ISD Board of Trustees and I would like to thank our community for voting and letting your voice be heard. While the election results are not what we had hoped for, we will continue to provide high-quality education for all students." She added, "We know that Coupland will continue to develop and student enrollment will continue to increase. Our facility challenges will not disappear, so the Board and I are committed to partnering with you to come up with another plan."

(Continued from page 16) Red River Restorations gust 2000. At this time, we will continue M-D Floors from another location."

The building has been bought by Katie and John Hindman, owners of Red River Restorations. John and Katie restore historic wood and steel windows and doors, and build custom wood windows, doors, screen doors, and window screens.

John started the company in the Hyde Park/Hancock area of Austin in 2003 in a small workshop in his garage. He was working in high tech at Dell, but his first love was working with his hands, especially with wood.

He left Dell in 2007 to pursue woodworking. He and a friend spent eight hours in one day distributing fliers around his neighborhood and in two hours, he had his first woodworking job. John says, "Soon I had to hire some help." There are two components to what he and Katie do, the historic restorations and fine woodworking, and running a business.

Regarding their move to Coupland, Katie says, "We had built a pretty shop in Austin, it looked like an old general store, but we didn't own it. Our rent in Austin kept increasing. We had invested so much, but didn't own it, and ultimately we outgrew it."

Also on the Agenda was the consideration and possible action on a professional services reimbursement agreement for the Buford Ranch Project. Mr. Tiemann was not present at the meeting as he and his attorney wanted to go over and make suggested modifications to the agreement.

Council voted to execute a contract with P-3 Works, a Public Improvement District (PID) consultant. It was explained that this is in no way council approving a PID but simply giving a firm the authority to examine documents submitted by a developer desiring a PID.

Road maintenance continues to be one of the main issues facing the City. Jack and Barbara Piper met with the contractor, Alpha Paving, who has been doing the work for the city. The bid for repairs on CR 458 and throughout "old town" was \$36,881.25, and was approved by council at their January meeting. Council also voted to stripe Hoxie (in front of the Bank, Red River Restorations, the Coupland Inn and Dancehall). Work is to commence the middle of January.

Council meets the second Thursday of each month in the Conference Room of St. Peter's Church, 108 Wathen at 6 p.m. Agendas for each meeting are posted at the ESD #10 Fire Station, the Bank, and the Post Office, and on the city's website.

Katie and John have four children, and the family still lives in Austin. John and Katie make the trip to their shop in Coupland weekly, and they are very happy with their new building.

Katie notes, "The building is a perfect fit for us. Eventually, we will restore the store front correctly. We will install time-period correct windows and an awning to make the building look original and to fit in this historic town." Based on the clues that are there and on his knowledge,


St. Peter's Church News

As we enter this new year of 2023, I invite you to think not about resolutions for the future but rather to consider a self-examination of what exists in your life that might be holding you back from embracing the future. At worship on New Year's Day, I shared the following story.

Several years ago, a large group of Vietnam veterans met in New York to commemorate the Vietnam War and its effects on their lives. Many were still suffering emotional wounds from that devastating conflict. A Vietnamese Buddhist monk came to the gathering and told a moving story.

During the war, a young Vietnamese woman was killed. She left behind her husband and her young son. The husband, needing to provide for himself and the boy, traveled far and wide looking for odd jobs. Often, he left the child with neighbors. After one long trip looking for work, the man returned to find his village demolished and his neigh-



bors gone. Searching through the rubble, he found scattered about some small bones. He was sure that these were the remains of his beloved son. He wrapped the bones in cloth and carried them with him everywhere he went.

Many years passed, and one night the old man heard someone knocking on his door. He called out, "Who's there?"

"It is your son!" the voice outside replied.
"My kidnappers set me free, and I have spent many years trying to find you!"

The old man yelled, "You are a fake and a cruel man. My son is dead. Leave me alone!" He would not open the door.

The pounding continued for a while, but then it stopped. The young man gave up and left.

The old man never found happiness. And he lost his son who was still living. Why? Because he was determined to hold on to the bones of the past.

The message for each of us is to take some time to see what we are holding onto that is keeping us from moving forward in our lives. It may be previous relationships that hurt us and we cannot see a way to forgive the person. It may be that we made some major mistake in our lives and we cannot forgive ourselves. It may be unfulfilled dreams we had when we were younger and we think that we can never pursue them at this stage of our lives. Whatever it is that is holding you back, address it now and release its grip on you. If we stop holding on to the bones of the past, we will find a lot more happiness and fulfillment in this new year of 2023.

Emergency Services District #10 News By Maranda Cummings

Board Meetings are being held in person at the Coupland Fire Station each second Tuesday of the month. The meetings are also available via telephone conferencing. This information is available each month on the meeting notice posted at the Coupland Fire Station, Coupland Post Office, Citizens National Bank in Coupland, Thrall Fire Station, and Thrall Post Office. The approved minutes, meeting notice/agenda, and audited financial report are also posted on the ESD's website at www.wcesd10.org.

You might notice the new Williamson County ESD #10 patch on our trucks and uniforms. Thank you, John Roulston-Bates and the Board, for taking the time to create a professional patch for the district! The Board approved the purchase of two command vehicles including equipment. This will give each district (Coupland and Thrall) a new command vehicle. The ESD also plans on ordering another tender and brush truck this budget year since they likely won't come in for the next couple years due to supply chain delays.

The fire chiefs are working on finding future fire station locations in the Beyersville and Structure areas. The plan is to find a location with a five-to-ten-minute response time to help reduce response times to calls within ESD #10. The chiefs want to be proactive in finding a location to get ahead of the growth we all know is coming our way. Mark Moellenberg (WCESD #10 Fire Chief) stated the fire chiefs will have an architect in place to design the station(s) faster with the plan to have the core details of the fire station completed first and offices and leisure rooms being added later.





Ukraine Update-By Debrah Candelas

In the August and November Heralds, we had articles by Debrah Candelas about her humanitarian trip to Ukraine. She is sponsoring a Ukrainian mother Zoia and her son Max. Max attends Coupland School. Here is Debrah's latest report about how things are going in Ukraine.

It is difficult for Zoia to talk about things over there. She talks with her mother every day. Some days mama reports all is well. There have been times that she has reported not having any electricity at the time of the call. They are on rolling blackouts, and they have about five hours of power a day. It is a low number of hours to accomplish all that is needed and to get warm. Couple that with the fact that your time might be in the middle of the night.

Photos from Ukraine sent to Debrah after Ukrainians received "care packages" from her.

Also, there is concern that Chernihiv might once again be called upon to hold off an attack from Belarus if they make another march toward Kiev. There has been another buildup of troops/equipment along the border of Belarus/Ukraine. Chernihiv is directly in the path of a march to the capital which is why they were pounded so heavily at the beginning.

Zoia's husband texted me after we sent a care package over around Thanksgiving. He thanked me for taking care of his family and for the packages. He said that they help remind them that they are not forgotten. That haunts me. I cannot imagine what they are going through, and add to that the fact that you do not know if it will get worse or how long it is going to last.

They know that the country is being supported by many governments and they are extremely grateful, but I can imagine the hopelessness they must feel at times. As we weathered this most recent cold spell, I was very much aware of my blessings. I have a home to protect my family from the elements, and I can keep them warm. I have the luxury of grocery stores. Much of what the western world takes for granted moves to a different level of meaning when you stop and think that not everyone has what we do.

On a happier note, Coupland ISD had their Christmas concert, the fifth grade performed a traditional Ukrainian dance, and Max had a solo. He nailed it! Zoia and Max had a great first American Christmas.





John can tell what the original Mercantile building would look like, but the Hindmans would like to see a picture of the original building. If anybody has a picture of the old Mercantile, please let the Hindmans know. You can reach Katie at katie@redriverrestorations.com, 512-705-9086.

They are making use of all the high space in the 14,000-foot warehouse by building a layer of plywood shops inside the warehouse. Katie notes, "We have built large, climatized rooms that are work rooms for sanding, repair, painting, and glass cutting. The wood shop is in the main area on the raised platform. On historic buildings and homes, our goal is to restore as much as possible or make replicas if there is so much rot that there is nothing left to restore." They do onsite work on jambs and take the windows and doors to the shop where they can be worked on safely, out of any bad weather.

The Hindmans have worked on the most venerable structures in Texas, including the Alamo, the Texas Capitol, the LBJ Texas White House, and six historic county courthouses.



The latest was the Blanco County Courthouse. Katie says, "We just finished up the O. Henry Museum in Austin where, in addition to the windows and doors, we also restored built-in book shelves and crown molding involving intricate wood work."

They are working now at the King Ranch. Katie says, "We just finished restoring the steel casement windows and are moving on to the wood windows."

Katie notes that what they do involves "a lot of steps and a ton of labor. It is often more expensive to restore than to buy new, but once restored, they should last another 100 years with proper maintenance. Most new modern windows now only last 15-20 years. We build replica windows with wood and methods historically used so they will last. We call them 100-year windows."

Bentoli, an animal feed company, rents the store-front and part of the storage space in back.

The Hindmans have about 10-15 employees, and Katie says, "We are always looking to hire good talent. We would love to find local talent."

She adds, "Feel free to reach out to us. Everyone has been so nice, and we are happy to be here. We want to contribute in a positive way to the community." Red River Restorations -- Saving Historic Doors, Windows & More

Coupland's historic Mercantile building is now home to Red River Restorations. Us old-timers remember when it was the John Thompson building, when Mr. Thompson added the large warehouse space to the old "store" space. Then, sculptor Jim Huntington was in the building, using the spacious warehouse for his work, and he built a living space in the back of the Mercantile area. After Jim moved his studio across the street next to his sculpture garden, Martin and Deb Samuelson moved their business, M-D Custom Wood Flooring, into the facility, and now the Samuelsons have sold the building.

Deb says, "M-D Floors is leaving behind a building we've occupied for 22 years. Martin and I ran our wood floor company out of the old Thompson building we purchased from Jim Huntington in Au-
