Jennifer Dollins, Community-Wide Communications As has been previously stated, the Coupland City Council meetings are held the second Thursday of each month now beginning at 6 p.m. in the Coupland Volunteer Fire Department's Meeting Room. One will find copies of the Agendas and Minutes from all Council Meetings on the City's website, http://www.cityofcouplandtx.us.

Road maintenance is a continuing matter. The pavement covering three culverts on CR 458 was levelled and patched. Other areas needing attention have been identified and work will soon be scheduled. These areas not only encompass CR 458 but within "old town" Coupland as well.

The Interlocal Agreement between Williamson County and the City of Coupland for the upcoming work on Muery and Broad Streets was signed, notarized, and the original was hand delivered to a representative of the County. Work is projected to commence in November and will be an enormous improvement not only for the citizens who live on or near those streets, but the City as well.

The City Council approved and passed two Ordinances during their September meeting. Just a note, these Ordinances are required by law. They are as follows:

- 1. Passed the levy of an ad valorem tax on property within the corporate limits at a rate of 0.215934 / 100 valuation of property. Please note that this ad valorem tax rate is less than last year's rate of 0.237459 / 100 valuation. Just as a quick note, the City's ad valorem tax rate initially passed following incorporation was 0.250000 / 100 valuation.
- 2. Reviewed and approved the Ordinance adopting the annual budget for the fiscal year October 1, 2021, through September 30, 2022.

Mayor Piper, Barbara Piper, and Russell Schmidt along with Michael Cooper from Commissioner Boles' office met with Williamson County Sheriff Gleason to discuss a Memorandum of Understanding for police service for the City of Coupland.

I can't recall how many Best Fests we had, but when the Club became the Civic Organization, we had annual block parties, usually held in April or May. They featured parades, different kid activities (duck pond, jump house, train toss) as well as a dunk tank, art and crafts vendors, food vendors, a silent auction, and live music from a variety of bands. Our major fundraiser was a fish fry. In October 2008, the Coupland Fest was born, and its theme was Choo Choo, hence Choo Choo Fest. This became the major fundraiser for the Civic Organization. Hopefully next spring, we'll be able to have our second fundraiser, the annual Golf Tournament.

I want to salute the past presidents of the Coupland Civic Organization. Many of them served multiple terms in an often-demanding job. The very first president of the CCO was Brian Birch. Following him was Lois Jebo Duncan, Irene Florida, Buz Garry, Sylvia Summers and Barbara Piper. Thanks to all of you!

#### Fire Academy Class of 2021

At the end of October, the first Fire Academy operated by ESD #10 drew to a close. Students from Coupland, Cameron, Milano, and Weir FDs had their burn day at Pflugerville's burn facility, getting to practice interior and vehicle firefighting. On October 30, our academy will be the first in the state to take the new State Firefighters and Fire Marshals Association electronic testing; this will be hosted at Coupland Station.

We'll be starting the 2022 Fire Academy in March; between now and then we're running a Driver and Fire Pump Operator course in cooperation with our colleagues in Weir.

This course will help us train new fire engine drivers to state standard.

#### Always Keep Your Eyes Open

When we get a call, we never quite know what we're going to find when we arrive on scene. In September we got a useful reminder to always pay attention. After finishing up at a "routine" motor vehicle accident our all-volunteer engine crew left the scene, turned the engine around at a safe spot, then started on their way back to the station. As they were driving back past the accident scene, they noticed a car still pulled over at the side of the road with its hazard lights on. Our crew could have easily driven by, after all their job was done, but they decided to stop and check on the driver.

They found an older gentleman in the vehicle who gave them cause for concern, so they kept him safe and requested an ambulance. A Wilco Deputy stopped to see what was going on, he was able to look up and call the gentleman's home number to contact his family. It turned out that

The CWSC board of directors would like to remind you of the following regulation that relates to any CWSC customer who experiences a significant water leak affecting their water consumption during the months of December 2021 and January 2022:

Since the CWSC determines a customer's wastewater rates for the calendar year based on a customer's water use in December and January, in the event a customer experiences a burst water pipe or significant water leak in December and January, and if the customer produces proof of this leak to the President or Vice President of the CWSC, then the CWSC can--at its discretion--change the averaging months from December and January to December and February or January and February in order to obtain a more accurate wastewater average. If you need to contact the CWSC call 512-856-2435.

Please note that proof of a leak may include pictures, repair invoices, or plumbing receipts.



In visiting with folks, it seems that the first quality that they love about living and worshiping here is the strong sense of community. I have experienced that myself in a number of settings. I attended the National Night Out and participated in the Choo Choo Fest sponsored by the Coupland Civic Organization. It should be noted that the CCO holds their regular meetings in our Fellowship Hall. I am also proud of the way our congregation stepped up to meet a need when the Coupland School discovered that due to construction delays, they needed a space for their Pre-K class. We quickly made it possible for the class to use a large classroom that the church was not using. # Coupland Author Reports New Book in Progress

Charlene Hanson Jordan was in the process of writing her latest book on our area's history when a difficulty of modern life intruded.

The projected finish date was delayed by something not able to be imagined when the characters in my book lived near what became Coupland and Type. My telephone company quit supporting my CapTel captioned telephone, part of a free Federal program for the hard of hearing where a screen displays the conversation. I lost a month of writing time before I could continue with the book. It was my Internet provider, SOS out of Georgetown, who fixed the problem in a few minutes. They simply linked my phone to the Internet.

To continue with my book, the tentative title is "Whose Land is This?" It's the history of Post Oak Island up to 1875. The main characters in the book are the Thomas Augustus Graves and the Ibrey J. Kidd families, but include Adam Lawrence, Marmaduke Gardner, Sam Smith, Ira Leffingwell, the Barkers, and Mary Christian Burleson.

The expected finish date is now next Spring in time for the dedication of the Post Oak Island historical marker which will be placed near the Type Cemetery marker on County Road 466.

The book describes daily living experiences southeast of Coupland a century and a half ago – so very different from captioned phones and Internet connections.


# Update on Historical Marker For Post Oak Island Community

Board Meetings are being held in person at the Coupland Fire Station each second Tuesday of the month. Meetings are also available via telephone conferencing. This information is available each month on the meeting notice. The approved minutes, meeting notice/agenda, and audited financial report are also posted on the ESD's website at www.wcesd10.org.

The ESD purchased a forcible entry training door worth \$7,745, which will be used for training local volunteer firefighters in the Ignis Fire Academy. The ESD approved \$14,948 worth of improvements to the Coupland Fire Station and purchasing of equipment valued at \$122,652 requested by both Coupland and Thrall Volunteer Fire Departments. This

# CCO Resumes Monthly Meetings, Hears from CARTS Representative

On September 27, in St. Peter's Fellowship Hall, Coupland Civic Organization (CCO) held its first monthly meeting since meetings were suspended because of COVID. After a supper of taco salad and homemade desserts prepared by CCO board members, the program was presented by Haley Partin, community engagement director of CARTS (Capital Area Rural Transportation System).

Currently, Coupland is served on Thursdays by the Country Bus, which is door-to-door service with 24-hour advance notice recommended. Every Thursday, the bus departs Coupland for Austin at 7:30 a.m. and returns at 2 p.m., \$6 fare one way, \$3 reduced. Riders can get around Austin on Capital Metro. Service to Taylor is on the first and third Thursdays. Bus departs at 9:30 a.m. and returns at 1:30 p.m., \$4 fare one way, \$2 reduced. Reduced fare is half fare for registered CARTS customers, seniors 65 and older, persons with disabilities, and children under 12.

CARTS has started a free pilot program, CARTS Now, that serves Taylor. With 15 minutes notice, the rider can go several places within Taylor. Also, the rider can transfer to the interurban coach and go city to city. CARTS Now is free right now; eventually it will cost \$2 or \$1 reduced fare. CARTS Now is a low-cost, on-demand ride service that allows riders to get from point A to point B on their own time. CARTS Now has no predetermined routes or schedules, and rides are available within 15 minutes of scheduling.

CARTS material explains: This service will provide curb-to-curb transportation between any two points within the Taylor City Limits. Users can request a ride from anywhere in town and meet their driver at a nearby curb or corner to be dropped off at a curb near their destination. The service is not limited to trips that bring riders to and from CARTS stations or transit stops. Service hours are Monday – Friday, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.


Capital Metro can integrate with Amtrak, Greyhound, and Trailways. Some stations are both CARTS and Capital Metro. On Austin's East Side, many lines come together and from there riders can go to the airport.

A Tribute to Marilyn Samuelson, Long-Time Herald Contributor And Dedicated Community Worker By Her Granddaughter Tamra Mangum

Marilyn Berglund Samuelson was born on June 7, 1930, on her parents' farm, to Martin Berglund and Esther Peterson Berglund in the Manda community where Marilyn grew up with her four siblings She attended Manda school and graduated from Elgin High School where she met the love of her life, David Wilburn Samuelson.

Marilyn and David married on March 1, 1949, at New Sweden Lutheran Church when Marilyn was 18 years old. Together, they had 5 children, 11 grandchildren, and 20 great-grandchildren. In 1975, they built their dream home on farmland just outside of Coupland.

Outside of her work, she volunteered countless hours to her greatest passions - God, heritage, community, and farming. Marilyn played a key role in the formation of Manville Water Supply Corporation, Friends of Manda School, Farmers Union, Blackland Prairie Concerned Citizens, and Travis County ESD #13. She was dedicated to conserving farmland, advocating for farmers, preserving history and historic buildings, and serving the local community.

She was devoted to New Sweden Lutheran Church, and she helped found the New Sweden Heritage Center and the New Sweden Historical Society. Her grandchildren, who called her Memaw, have memories of picking cotton, shucking corn, harvesting a garden, checking the chicken coop, making bread from scratch, and sitting beside her on the piano bench. Making sure the church building was prepared to welcome guests on Sunday morning was a part of summers spent with Memaw, serving others to accomplish a greater good.

Marilyn touched many lives in her 91 years on this Earth. She is the puzzle piece that completes the full picture for many scenes around Travis and Williamson Counties--the farming community, local history, and preservation of the land and historic buildings.

equipment included the following: 10 new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatuses (SCBAs); 2 Rapid Intervention Crew packs; tools and equipment for both fire departments' vehicles; upgraded scene lights to LED; nozzles for both departments; 2 gas monitors for emergency response and 1 calibration station to be used by both departments; and extrication equipment.

The ESD also approved the purchase of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), 1 medical and 1 trauma bag for each truck in each department, medical bags for members of each department, and 5 Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) for a total cost of about \$60,000. In the past, each department had one medical bag that was "grab and go" when medical calls were received. These new bags will allow each truck to be equipped for medical calls.

The ESD is continuing research on upgrading the fleet to better provide emergency services to the district. This would include purchasing a 3500-gallon tender worth \$350,000. The Board of Commissioners agreed that the next step would be to contact Government Capital to secure financing.

The Board of Commissioners agreed to keep the same tax rate that has been in effect since the ESD was formed in 2005, which is 10 cents per \$100 property valuation. They have also approved paying two firefighters to perform administrative duties.

If any of our area residents are interested in volunteering to support our volunteer firefighters, they can contact Jared Cummings (Coupland VFD Fire Chief) about joining the Volunteer Auxiliary Unit. This unit will provide assistance to the volunteer firefighters when needed (e.g., bringing bottled water to calls or helping with the annual chili supper). 


