#### News from the City of Coupland By Mayor Jack Piper

Wow! It is hard to believe that when I first moved to Coupland during the summer of 2007, I would anticipate being in public service for ten and one-half years. Many of you recall all of the efforts many community members supported during the incorporation process. Well, Coupland did incorporate in November of 2012 and elected its first mayor and council in May of 2013. There were many "bumps" in the road, but one that I vividly recall immediately following election to office. The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDot) came to the city and informed us that we owed over twelve thousand dollars in fees for right-of-way purchases along FM 1660. The ironic part of this is that at that time, the city only had just a little over twelve hundred dollars in the bank. Luckily, TxDot offered the city a payment plan and in a period of three years, that "debt" was settled.

During the incorporation process, it was heard loud and clear that citizens wanted this city/community to remain a farming/ranching community. I believe we have all strived to enact and pass as few ordinances as necessary and still represent and protect the citizens.

Times are changing; growth is upon us and I believe we all welcome growth but remain steadfast in our efforts to be able to control the growth.

#### President's Message—Coupland History By Susan Schmidt, CCO President

Happy Fall to all. After this brutally hot summer, it is very nice to have some cooler temperatures.

This has been a busy time for the Coupland Civic Organization. By the time this edition of the *Herald* is printed and mailed, Choo Choo Fest has occurred and possibly Trunk or Treat. I am positive both events were successful and fun for the community.

In previous columns in the *Herald*, I have looked back over the years. With this *Herald* and subsequent ones, I will be writing about the history of Coupland. My sister, Barbara Piper, was looking through some old documents belonging to our father, C. W. Pfluger (Bill). She found a history of Coupland he wrote so I will be quoting directly from this document.

"Coupland City, Texas was an early day real estate adventure of the Coupland City Company. C.H. Welch and H. Dickson of Taylor, Texas; Major Theodore VanBuren Coupland of Coupland City, Texas; C. C. Coupland and J.D. Coupland of St. Clair County, Alabama, incorporated the Coupland City Company in a charter dated January 19, 1887, and filed March 28, 1887, as recorded in Volume 42, page 365, Deed Records, Williamson County, Texas. The purpose, as stated in Article 2 of the charter, was for purchase, subdivision, and sale of land in the town of Coupland, recently established on the line of the Taylor, Bastrop and Houston railway." "The original acreage was then purchased by the Coupland City Company on February 9, 1887, from T.V. Coupland, James D. Coupland, C.C. Coupland, and the afore mentioned as trustees for Ella, Nancy, Ada and Ida McMellion, children of their deceased sister, residing in St. Clair County, Alabama. The consideration being \$2,000 for approximately 200 acres."

"The Coupland City Company with its offices in Taylor proceeded to build a city. Circulars were printed advertising a public auction sale of town lots at the 'New Town of Coupland City' to be held Thursday, May 12, 1887, with Captain J.A.H Hosack, auctioneer. Little is known about the results of the auction. However, the advertising was quite convincing. The 'New Town of Coupland City' was advertised as being located on the Taylor, Bastrop and Houston railway in the southeastern portion of Williamson County, 8 ½ miles south of the thriving city of Taylor and 8 ½ miles north of Elgin, on the Houston and Texas Central Railway."

I spoke with members of the board regarding the superintendent's search. They all agreed they were pleased with the applicants who responded to the search. They are now in the process of interviewing applicants and hope to announce the final selection in November/December.

On another note, I am the community member on the design team for the new Middle School. It was a pleasure to see the Claycomb Architect firm in action. The team met with teachers, coaches, technology director, and librarian to discuss the wishes for the new Middle School. It was amazing to see one of the architects in action as he drew and redrew plans for each individual space. Jeffrey Floyd, the architect, was able to provide such excellent advice for each facet of the building. He made valid suggestions but incorporated all ideas into his drawings.

Progress has been made toward the construction aspect of the Middle School. A survey company, geo-tech company, and an at-risk construction company have all been hired. I am not sure of the actual schedule for each component before the actual construction takes place, but I will keep you informed.

Road maintenance is an enormous problem for Coupland. Funds collected through ad valorem taxes do not allow the city to completely renovate the largest road maintenance problem, CR 458. The city did present a meaningful presentation to the Precinct 4 Bond Committee this past May. We were delighted to learn that the Williamson County Commissioners did elect to include this proposal in the November 2023 Bond Election. If this Bond passes, it will enable CR 458 to be completely renovated (cost for this project exceeds 5 million dollars).

So, in closing I say to you, it's been a pleasure serving you during my capacity as Mayor of Coupland. We'll see you at the Post Office or having coffee at the Bank.

#### Note from the Editor: Thank You Mayor Jack

Mayor Jack Piper has been Mayor ever since Coupland incorporated. After over 10 years of public service, he has chosen not to run for re-election. The new mayor will be Russell Schmidt. News from Coupland Water Supply Corporation By Steven Voelker, President, CWSC

1. If a property within the boundary of the CWSC is sold or otherwise transferred to a new property owner, and if that property was never legally connected to the sewer system, then the new property owner must pay the one-time Tap Fee in order to connect to the sewer system. 2. If a property within the boundary of the CWSC has at any time been legally connected to the sewer system, the new property owner is not obligated to pay the one-time Tap Fee but must pay the Transfer Fee in order to reestablish or resume a connection to the sewer system. 3. Please note that additional Tap Fees are required in the event a property owner wants additional connections to the sewer system. Please note that any and all connections to the sewer system are subject to review and approval by the CWSC Board of Directors.

### September 25 CCO Meeting— Coupland School and Aeroponic Farm



At the September 25 meeting, the Coupland Civic Organization heard from two speakers.

#### **Coupland School**

Michael Roepke, Vice President of the Coupland School Board, discussed the progress of the new Middle School and other school topics. The design committee

for the school now includes a member from the community, Susan Schmidt, the CCO President. There is no definite timeline yet for the school construction.

The Board is searching for a permanent superintendent. Roepke said a superintendent could be named by the end of October. He said things are going well with the interim superintendent Pilger and principal Booker. There are still some vacancies; he said that most schools are having difficulties filling all vacancies right now. Coupland needs a bus driver, social studies teacher, life skills teacher, and security officer.

Enrollment is up 5% since school started, from 285 to 299. He referred attendees to the school Facebook page. The school is starting to use BoardBook, a meeting organization and website tool, which, he said, will make it easier for the community to find agendas and minutes.

Another new policy—two board members will meet with the community every two months. The first meeting will be November 9 at 6 p.m. Board members will update the bond situation and talk about concerns and questions. As a whole, the board can then discuss these concerns. Regular board meetings are the second Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. in the school library.

Recently, two board members have resigned. When Roepke was asked about filling these vacancies, he said he didn't know what would happen, that there were certain legalities that had to be met.

#### Vermillion Farms, Aeroponic Farming

The second speaker was Will Vermillion. He and his wife Danielle own and operate Vermillion Farms, an aeroponics farm that they started in the Coupland area two years ago.

In aeroponics, plant roots are suspended in air on towers. Vermillion Farms has a 4300- square-foot greenhouse with over 100 towers. Vermillion explains, "The towers are ten feet tall. We start with seeds. We are seeding every week, and we harvest and sell out every week." They use a powder with the 16 minerals that are necessary for plants. He says, "All the minerals they need to grow are there." Right now, he orders the minerals; he is planning to create his own for each plant.

Also the Ph of the water is very important. Drip irrigation is three minutes on and twelve minutes off, letting the roots dry out in between. No pesticides are used; ladybugs and bug zapper are used for pest control. Bumble bees provide pollination.

Currently, they are growing five types of lettuce, bell peppers, cucumbers, and tomatoes in one greenhouse. Lettuce is sold with roots attached; it will stay fresh for three weeks in the bag in the refrigerator. They are planning a second greenhouse.

Vermillion notes "Aeroponics has done extraordinarily well in desert areas. It has spread all over the U.S. and in farms all over the world."

Up until now, Vermillion Farms has sold their produce at area farmers markets. They are located in the Coupland area off of County Road 456, and they are beginning free delivery in the Coupland area. Order from their website,



Vermillion-Farms.com. Your produce is picked the day you order it and delivered fresh to you the next day.

Vermillion comments, "In a greenhouse there is no winter. We can arrange tours of the greenhouse. To see the towers in person is quite an experience."

#### Choo Choo Fest



### Q&A with Coupland Resident Tony Morgan AKA "Tony the Tire Man" By Wells Mason

**Question**: As a long-time resident of Coupland, some people know you, but many do not. Where were you born? Where else have you lived? How long have you been in Coupland? **Answer**: I was born and raised in Missouri. Since high school, I've lived in several different states. I wound up in Texas about 35 years ago, and I was lucky enough to find Coupland about 20 years ago.

**Question**: You are the owner/operator of TDM Tire Service. Tell us about that?

**Answer**: I'm mainly focused on farming tire service. I find deer horns and all kinds of things that go through a tire. The crazy service call is where you drive 250 miles to do a 15-minute job. I've been doing this type of service since my fa-ther's service station in the 60's and 70's, but I'm on the verge of retirement - or at least slowing down.

**Question**: What do you like to do when you're not working? **Answer**: My late wife and I were into antique junk. We collected Coca Cola signs and anything with soft drink advertising on it. Most of our stuff is from the early 1900's to the late 70's. We gave tours of the house and yard on a regular basis. We started the Christmas Tire Tree about 14 years ago. I'm gonna keep the tree going. I'm gonna start putting it up late October.

**Question**: Can people stop by and photograph the Christmas Tire Tree?

**Answer**: Yes, people are welcome to stop by and take pics. If I'm available, I will be glad to show them around.

**Question**: You also restore old vehicles, right? **Answer**: Yes, the old trucks are my mental health saviors. They keep me busy and I love working on them.

**Question**: If you had to pick just one or two things, what do you like most about Coupland?

Answer: The people in the community. And the country life.

**Question**: Anything else you want to add? **Answer**: I am blessed with a very large family and, in the end, family is what matters most. I have 6 kids, 14 grand-kids, and 8 great grand-kids. I am very proud of them all.

Since 1999, Wells Mason is also a long-time resident of Coupland. He's a designer and sculptor and the owner of Ironwood Industries along with his wife Jessica. Twenty years ago, he spearheaded the heady effort to build a community center designed by Texas Tech University architecture students in downtown Coupland, and he's proud of the conversations that it sparked within the community. He also served on the Coupland Water Supply Corporation Board of Directors for many years including President. His studio is headquartered in Coupland with satellite operations in Taylor and Marfa.







#### Wells and Jessica Mason Exhibit Jim Huntington's Work in Marfa

Wells and Jessica Mason of Coupland's Ironwood Industries are creating a remote studio in Marfa, Texas. In early October, amidst the rubble of their renovation of an adobe building, they showed recent work—including drawings and small sculptures—by Coupland artist Jim Huntington. They also unveiled a large-scale sculpture by Jim that's permanently installed in the yard.

According to Wells, "It was a terrific weekend. We hosted people Thursday, Friday, and Saturday during Chinati Weekend. We met scores of art-loving people from all over the country." The opening reception was October 5, 5-8 p.m., and the open house was October 6-7, 10 a.m.-4 p.m.

For Wells and Jessica, this will be an annual event. Next year, they plan to show Wells' work. The Chinati Foundation is a contemporary art museum in Marfa, and Chinati Weekend is an important cultural event for West Texas.



The 2023 FreshGrass Awards have been announced. Ella lives in Boston and performs with a band called Mile Twelve, a progressive string band from Boston and winner of the 2020 International Bluegrass Music Association New Artist of the Year award, The band takes its name from the mile marker at Boston's southern border on Route 93, a road sign they've passed countless times while heading out on tour. Minnie lives in Brooklyn. Her album, "What Larks," released in October 2021, is based on bird song. Both girls graduated from the Berklee College of Music in Boston. They are the daughters of Andre and Marcy Buffington Jordan and the granddaughters of Henry and Charlene Hanson Jordan.

### Charlene Jordan on Writing

Editor's note: Coupland author Charlene Hanson Jordan has had a varied writing career, including books and newspaper articles. Here are her thoughts that are helpful to anybody who is interested in writing.

What I've learned by writing local area historical articles on a deadline: Discipline. In writing three articles weekly on Patreon: Extreme discipline!

The search for photographs to illustrate the articles is painstaking but is important to me.

The action of putting the articles on paper or on the internet, with as few errors as possible, is a challenge all its own.

Filing? I haven't mastered that yet!
